

The legacy Danielle Aitchison hopes to leave behind one day is that despite her disability, "I can work hard and do anything I put my mind to".

The New Zealand para-athlete from Patetonga lives with two uncommon types of cerebral palsy - Ataxia and Athetoid, and has cochlear implants due to deafness in both ears.

But her journey with cerebral palsy has

not been an obstacle but a stepping stone

to her aspirations.

The 23-year-old athlete competed at the 2024 Paralympics in Paris last month, claiming silver medals in the Women's 200m T36 and the Women's 100m T36 disciplines.

The former Hauraki Plains College student told *The Profile* she had mixed feelings during those moments.
"I was a bit disappointed in myself as I

knew I had a real chance to get the gold

medal," she said.

Danielle worked really hard and "to be so close" was difficult, she said.

"At the same time, two silver medals is a huge accomplishment."

Danielle, who now resides in Kirikiriroa, Hamilton, said she was really proud to have something that reflected all her hard work, dedication and sacrifice over the past three years.

In the 200m race, Danielle dashed across In the 200m race, Danielle dashed across the finish line at 27.64 seconds, just behind gold medalist Shi Yiting, who crossed the line at 27.50 seconds.

"I gave it my all, but [I] was so tired."

It was the second time Danielle had run the distance in 27 seconds, she said.

"Knowing that it is not a fluke and I can do it just makes me so happy."

hind Shi at 13.39 seconds. "It was also a lot of fun to challenge myself and have a good race with Shi.

When Danielle gets ready to "power out" of the blocks, "nothing goes through my mind", she said.

'I am so focused on me and just running." After her race, Danielle's first thought was to find her family so she could hug them, she said. Her partner created 'Team Dani' shirts "so it made it a lot easier to find them in the crowd".

It was a "cool experience" to let her family "see a bit of my world and what I do", Danielle said. "And also expose them to so many

Danielle's second course of action was about "living in the moment" with her podium competitors, and being proud to represent their countries, Danielle said.

Her silver medals resembled a "bit of

hope" to know she can work even harder and "get that gold medal" in the future.

But it was clear that the path to the po-

dium was a shared one.

'My biggest support has been my mum.

"She continues to support me in all my decisions and all my successes and failures within my career

Danielle said that despite what is happening in her mum's life - "she always flies around the world to be there at my international competitions'

Her mum contributed to Danielle's success with "unwavering support" and "the mindset she instilled in me", she said.



Athletics was a part of Danielle's upbring-

ing in a sporty family.
But in high school, she found it difficult to play mainstream sports due to her disabili-ties "so I decided to stop", she said. Danielle was reunited with athletics when

she went to the 2017 Halberg Disability Games, she said.

"I have been doing it ever since and love it. I feel like I found a place where I feel nor-

Danielle's advice for young athletes with disabilities who aspired to compete at the Paralympics was to enjoy the journey

It can be a hard and long road to get there, Danielle said. "Sometimes the Paralympics isn't everything you hoped it to be or you don't achieve your goals.

But Danielle said to enjoy the journey of training and pushing yourself and to relish travelling for sports and seeing the world.

Being an athlete can be tiring but also

Her reason for being in the Paralympics was to "just be the best I can be, and have fun", she said. "It is also a chance to showcase to the world what people with disabilities can achieve. We are not a minority."

Danielle said life was all about having fun and enjoying the moments.
"I love to run fast and that brings me joy.

"The fact I can do it for a job is even cool-



# New business association to revitalise Paeroa

Businesses in Paeroa have a new avenue for advocacy, support and networking with the formation of a town business association.

The new Paeroa Business Association (PBA) is a rebranding of the existing organisation, Positive Paeroa, a long-standing society focused on promoting the town and its events. The change was announced at the society's September 26 AGM, held at The Refinery.

Committee member Tim

Watts said the new business association structure was about clarifying the society's aims.

Positive Paeroa's] been a little bit rudderless in recent years, and struggled around its purpose," he said.

"What we've wanted to do is reignite what we're doing

from a business point of view. Get people back together, get people sharing ideas, learning from each other."

The PBA's new constitution outlined two aims: assisting in the promotion and development of business activity in Paeroa; and advocating for the development of the commu-

nity.
"One of the key areas we're looking at here is around advocacy... how, as businesses, we can pick up what the common issues are, and then have those conversations with council,"

"I think having a voice for

business in town is incredibly important. We're redeveloping our website, redeveloping what we're doing from a social media point of view, and becom[ing] that key contact point.

Positive In recent years,

Paeroa has been responsible for the annual Santa Parade, local shop and win competi-tions, and Business After 5 and Women's Breakfast meetings.

The committee said becoming a business association would allow it to do much more.

"We're still going to do com-munity stuff, we're still going to have community members and we'll still advertise events that are happening," Rosie Scott for a while doing the basics of what it's done and now it's reinvigorated," Rhys Charmichael added.

The PBA will also introduce membership fees from April, 2025, granting members ac-cess to advertising, networking events and advocacy support.

The fees will supplement the funding it receives from Hauraki District Council, currently the only stream of revenue the society has. In 2023, its council grant was \$12,000

"We spend all of that money that we get back out into the community in terms of sup-

porting the events that we do, the big one obviously being the Christmas parade," Tim said.
"It's not a large membership fee but it's still going to be very helpful for us to be able to do more activities back to the do more activities back to the community."

The AGM was attended

by around 50 people, most of them business owners in Paeroa and the surrounding areas. The response to the rebranding was largely positive, with many people signing up as members on the spot.

The PBA also announced the first of its new projects at the AGM: enhancing the main street atmosphere with improved lighting, a reestab-lished main street radio system, and new business and Matariki flags.





# hames filmmakers explore 'unschooling'

desire to explore and learn "unseen worlds and communities" was the motivation behind Miriam Smith and Chris Pryor's documentary work.

The Thames-based filmmakers were in the middle of researching for a project when they came across families taking an "un-schooling" approach to education. Unschooling is one approach to "un-

home education, where instead of following a set curriculum, learning is directed by following the child's interests or passions.

Miriam Smith told *The Profile* 

they found it to be both surprising and fascinating.

They were amazed that the homeschool community had been so little documented on screen, Miriam said.

"We got to thinking it would be great to explore the usually 'hid-den' world of homeschooling in an intimate and personal documentary series.

On October 8, viewers will be able to see the launch and episode one of the six-part documentary series called *Home Education*, which will be available on *You-Tube* via *The Spinoff* website and also on Facebook and Instagram.

The series, made with the sup-port of NZ On Air, observes six families across Aotearoa who engage in different forms of home education.

This series took us from Kai-

kohe to Cromwell," Miriam said. The filmmakers, who were also known for their award-winning films *How Far is Heaven* and *The*

Ground We Won, made the series as "curious outsiders" - and to date, Miriam said they had always been outsiders in relation to all the communities they had filmed.

The "discovery-led" documentary process of learning from people was something they enjoyed, she said. "We often say we make our documentaries with our subjects, as opposed to being 'about' them.

Even though they were not looking to advocate for home education, Miriam said they wanted to "share our findings and observa-tions" so audiences could make their own conclusions from the stories.

But their "main joy" was getting to know the families they filmed.

During production, two of the families welcomed new babies into the world, which Miriam said "brought even more joy and cute-ness" to the whole experience.

Chris also enjoyed it when the kids took an interest in the filming process. One of the young stars they filmed was really involved with the behind the scenes camera operations and earned himself a number one camera assistant credit.

However, the documentary process didn't come without its hurdles. The biggest challenge for Photo: CHRIS PRYOR AND MIRIAM SMITH

Miriam and Chris was "capturing the material as it happens in the moment", Miriam said.

"If you miss a moment, it's gone

But there was another challenge that turned into something spe-cial. Miriam said she normally accompanied Chris when he filmed, but now the couple had a young child of their own - Chris directed, ran the cameras and sound on his

While technically it was "quite a stretch", Miriam said Chris being on his own created a much more intimate shooting environment' for the families.

As parents who were not planning to homeschool, Miriam said they learnt a lot from the families

that could be incorporated into their own child's learning journey.

Things like following the child's interest and "building learning around that", she said.

"There's a lot of stigma around home education" and Miriam

home education", and Miriam said attitude "gets in the way" of what could be learned from the homeschool community's proach to education.

Miriam and Chris' hope for viewers was that they would watch the series with the "mindset

of openness".
Although plans for a second series were not confirmed, Miriam said they were hoping this one would get lots of views and interest to "help show there's [an] appetite".

Miriam said it would be interesting to further explore the diverse range of approaches to home education.

"This is only the tip of the ice-

berg".

# Dog attacks on the rise in Hauraki

There have been 68 reports of dog attacks in the Hauraki District over the past year, according to a report presented at the council's September 25 meeting.

The report, outlining the council's dog control activities over the 2023-24 year, showed a decrease in barking dog complaints, down to 113 from last year's 141. However, the number of reported dog attacks - 68 - had risen significantly from last year's figure of 37. Dog attacks on people accounted for 18 of those reports, with the others involving dogs attacking other animals.

Reports of lost and roaming dogs also increased from 269 to

There are currently 4434 registered dogs in the Hauraki District. Fourteen of those are classified as dangerous by the council, and 102 as menacing.

Meanwhile, the meeting also saw the council commit to beautifying its public spaces, with the adoption of its Placemaking Plans for Kerepēhi, Ngatea and Paeroa.

The plans, funded by a Better Off funding package from the government, used feedback from Hauraki iwi and public workshops held in February to develop a series of proposed projects in the regional centres.

In Kerepēhi, the plans outlined a public playground upgrade, walking and cycling links to the nearby Piako River, and a wharf upgrade as priorities.

In Ngatea, projects focused on improving Tilsbury Reserve and the nearby bridge and stopbanks, and developing spaces to rest and socialise.

Paeroa's plans looked at developing Wharf St into a connection between the Ohinemuri River and the town centre, along with revitalising areas like TeTuīkairangi Primrose Hill, the domain, and the shopping area along Belmont St.

All the townships would also receive enhanced signage, planting and street furniture.

Funding for some of the projects was already accounted for in the council's long term plan, but the report said additional funding would need to be sourced from external agencies and institutions.

Meanwhile, the council also agreed to review its local alcohol, smoke- and vape-free, and gambling policies. Public consultation for these will begin on September 27.

# Lions raise \$300k for community

When people join the Lions Club, they become part of an international family, as well as a local group, she said. Waihī Lions raise money

Waihī Lions raise money through many events such as The Book Fair, Garden Ramble and the Trade and Community Directory.

"It's very rewarding helping with these events.

"By volunteering, you meet people, have a lot of fun and do some good in the process," she Waihī Lions Club runs the market in the Waihī Memorial Hall, every third Sunday of the month.

"This provides a sales-outlet for local craftspeople."

The club also runs or participates in the Waihī Lions Art and Street Festival, the warm up party for the Beach Hop, and Christmas in the park.

"We also provide person power for a range of other local activities."

# Thames fundraising events kick off

# Proposed business hub of Pipiroa fails to launch



As part of a Valley Profile series, MEGHAN HAWKES searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

#### 1910


The embryo town of the iroa, which was anticipated to be the business centre of the Hauraki Plains, was thrown open for selection.

The Farmers' Auctioneering Company of Hamilton had built stockyards in the vicinity, and a number of business people had visited the site of the proposed township. Sixty right township township. Sixty-eight town and suburban sections were offered for sale by the government but did not attract many bidders. The prices were considered ridiculously high and the sale was a failure.

Purchasers could not be found at the prices fixed, and only five suburban and two town sections sold.

Meanwhile, two train passengers complaining of extremely un-edifying behaviour by school pupils during a journey from Paeroa to Thames led to some debate between the headmasters of Thames High School and the Paeroa District High School.

The reports appeared to reflect on the pupils attending Thames High. The headmaster, Mr Rud-



man, made a thorough inquiry into the matter.

The stationmaster at Thames obtained reports from various rail-way officials which showed that no complaints had been made to him either by the public or railway officials, and the guards' reports spoke favourably of the conduct of

the pupils travelling.

Mr Murphy, Paeroa High headmaster, acknowledged that no particular school was mentioned by the passengers. Mr Rudman trust-ed that in future any passengers having complaints would address these to the railway officials or the headmaster most concerned.

He would refuse to issue train certificates to pupils who misconducted themselves on the train. The pupils were not guilty of any

terousness of schoolboys, which was bound to come out whenever several of them gathered together.

At Karangahake, the band rotunda was in a state of darkness and the Karangahake Band re-quested the Ohinemuri County Council have gas installed there as soon as possible. It was the intention of the band

to play in the rotunda at frequent intervals, and in the past they had found it very annoying using anti-quated torch lights with half a gale blowing. Councilor Lloyd said that they had a good boys' band in Karangahake, and a good rotunda. It was a pity to spoil it with the smoky torches. The work should be done at once.

A journey to Hikutaia by a Ka-

rangahake resident, and the subsequent purchase by him of five gallons of beer, landed him in the aeroa Police Court. Sergeant Mc-Kinnon said the defendant went to Hikutaia and purchased five gallons of beer from Julia Corbett. He put the beer barrel in a sack. It was not labelled properly, and he did not notify the vendor that he was bringing it into a no-license district. He got his beer safely as far as Paeroa, but Constable Henry happened to be on the Paeroa railway station platform and the package not being properly labelled he

Similar breaches of the law had been very frequent in this district and the rules had been well notified, said the Magistrate before fining the man.

Centre manager Jeff Whitfield said mentors gave one hour of their time twice a week to help and guide students to become safer drivers and to get their restricted driver licence.

"Word of the success of our work is out there and we have got more applications for mentored practice than mentors so we need more mentors," he

Colleen, who is a mentor in the programme said she was looking for something else to make life meaningful, to give back to the community and

meet some new people.

'It's very rewarding and only a couple of hours a week. It's a way of contributing to the community as having a driver's licence removes barriers to work and gives independence.

Another mentor, Jan, said it was good to see change and skills being implemented.

"Knowing you are helping to set up independence and jobs, it is so wonderful to be in-

volved."

Pete said he became a mentor to "be able to give something back to the wonderful Thames community that has been so welcoming to my wife and me since we moved here".



# Record fine for dairy effluent a 'wake-up call'

A Waikato farming company, a company director and a farm manager have been convicted and fined a combined \$305,900 for unlawful discharges of dairy effluent into the environment and contravention of abatement notices on numerous occasions

between August, 2022, and June, 2023.
Flint Farms Limited farm owner Barry
Flint and farm manager Gavin Flint were sentenced by Hamilton District Court Judge Melinda Dickey last week on 14 charges under the Resource Management Act as a result of a prosecution taken by Waikato Regional Council.

This is the largest fine for discharging contaminants into the environment in the Waikato region since the Resource Management

Act was introduced more than 30 years ago. In addition to the fines, Judge Dickey issued an Enforcement Order against Flint Farms Limited, requiring them to upgrade the farm effluent system and implement an effluent management plan to avoid further adverse effects on the environment.

In August, 2022, council officers conducted an inspection at the dairy farm owned by the defendant at Ngatea.

They found numerous breaches of environmental regulation, related to the discharge of dairy effluent from two effluent ponds, a sump and a stock underpass.

Two abatement notices were issued to the

defendants by the council to prevent further

discharges into the environment.

However, during follow up inspections over the next 10 months, additional breach-

es were identified.

"It's 2024. There simply can be no tolerance for not having adequate infrastructure on farm to manage animal effluent," Waikato Regional compliance manager Patrick Lynch said.

This fine should be a sharp wake-up call

for those farming operations who still have shoddy systems, or are not managing effluent systems properly

Tȟis region has had clear rules in place for the last 30 years prohibiting this kind of activity. It is very concerning that we still find contamination like this, even after putting a farm formally on notice.

To need a court order to ensure appropriate infrastructure is installed, that should have been in place decades ago, is incredibly disappointing. But those are the lengths we are having to go to in situations such as this to get some farming operations to do the

The group also performed at Thames High School and at the Thames Markets on September 21, Mrs Viskovich said.

Tamariki Pasifika teacher Ricky Teariki had been a Cook Island drum and dance teacher for many years, Mrs Viskovich said. He also worked in the mental health space

I didn't want to be like my intense friend who got ridiculed for trying too hard. Although she is now a neuroscientist making discoveries in the hunt for a cure to Huntington's disease. She did not settle for anything less than giving her best

Our paths are all different in life, and our skills and abilities varied. But I think what truly sets us apart is not intelligence, not our skills, or our ability to learn. What sets us apart is consistency, tenacity, and a belief it can be achieved.

There is a scene in an old movie classic, Coach Carter. One of the students stands to quote a poem mistakenly attributed to Nelson Mandela. But actually written by Marrianne Williamson. The original quote goes..

# HPC chess team bound for nationals

Agroup of Hauraki chess students is set to 'check' out the competition with their recent national final qualification.

Hauraki Plains College A chess team won the Checkmate Challenge in August, which has gained them entry for five players into the Chess Power Nationals event this month.

On top of this, the college took out the Checkmate Challenge on September 5, which secured them another spot for a sixth player to join the team for nationals. HPC chess club organiser

HPC chess club organiser Amanda Fiztpatrick said the students wouldn't have to worry about travel and accommodation expenses as they would attend the competition online from Hauraki Plains College.

Mrs Fitzpatrick said she had noticed students who wanted to play chess, help each other out, and who were interested in getting to the nationals.

The school Hub has held a fundraiser led by Mrs Fitzpatrick, for the entry fee for students to attend the chess tournaments. In return, students bring in grocery donations for the local food bank.

The six Hauraki Plains students who will put their skills to the test are: Prajwal Parajuli, Selwin de Haast, Leon Spilsbury, Ujwal Parajuli, Adelle Johnson and Kim Endino.

HPC chess champion at the recent Checkmate Challenge Selwin de Haast told *The Profile* it was

a "pretty great feeling" when he found out the team had qualified.

Selwin, who has played chess since he was five, planned to prepare for nationals by learning more openings and "fixing the gaps" in the ones he already knew, he said. It was really beneficial to get a good start in a game, Selwin said. "I am also going to play a lot of practice games against high level computers."

Selwin, who's biggest inspiration in chess was his dad, said had never been involved in a chess tournament before but looked forward to learning and facing some really good players.

He was trying to slow down during games and "not get cocky" as that often led him to blunder a lot of pieces, he said.

If he could create a new chess piece, Selwin said it would be called the priest and would replace the queen.

"[The priest] moves like a king, but can convert any enemy piece into your own piece by being next to them."

Meanwhile, year 9 student Adelle Johnson said she would create an upgraded pawn.

"It's like a normal pawn, but it can move two squares forward and can move diagonally."

can move diagonally."

When Adelle heard the team qualified for nationals, she said it felt like heaven had opened up its gates to "let us through".

To handle the pressure of competitive play, Adelle said she would

just focus on what's happening

in the game instead of worrying about the person she was playing. The reason she got into chess was because she watched her dad

play a game and asked if he could teach her how to play, she said. Her biggest inspirations in chess were her dad and little brother, she said. "Some of my moves are kind

of [dad's] and my brother's.
"I didn't steal their moves," she
said. "I had improved [them] with
