





Concurrent roadworks cause frustration

Acouncil road in Turua is being repaired at the same time as a four-week state highway closure this month.

Pavement rehabilitation works on Hauraki Rd are being undertaken concurrently with the Onetai Stream Bridge replacement on SH26 - despite it being the advised detour for travellers to take.

Hauraki Mayor Toby Adams said the roadworks did not come with the best of timing, but the schedule had been set before New Zealand Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA) had advised council of the February 10 closure of SH26, which runs between Paeroa and Thames.

"That portion of [Hauraki] road has needed work for a little bit of time, so we approved a budget, and that gave staff the ability to go out and get a tender with a start date, which they did," he said.

"All of a sudden, NZTA came out and said that they were starting work on the other side, which they were supposed to have done last year."

Mayor Adams said he and his chief executive wrote to the agency requesting a change of date for the bridge replacement, but this was denied.

He said he understood driv-

ers' frustration.

"It's no different for us as elected members and staff; those are roads that we travel frequently," he told *The Profile*.

"I mean, the plus side is that you'll still be able to travel through, it'll just be under stop-

go.

"And yes, there might be a bit more increased traffic from traffic that is coming the other way, but if you're local, you know there's multiple ways to

get around that, and it may be quicker to take a slightly longer route," he said.

"But either way, just plan your events to know that wherever you're going, or whichever way you're going, it's going to take a little bit longer, and if you already know that, it's a lot easier to deal with."

NZTA's Waikato systems manager Andrew Oakley said the transport agency had been in discussions with Hauraki District Council about its Onetai Bridge project from its inception, as it was aware the Turua works were being undertaken concurrently.

"As the Onetai Stream and the area surrounding the worksite is subject to flooding during wet weather, the works needed to be scheduled during the drier summer months – January through to March," he said.

"This bridge is at the end of its life and given its age and condition, delaying the project until next summer was not an option.

"We understand that the road closure will be inconvenient to residents and businesses, and our contractor will work as quickly as possible in order to minimise the length of time the road needs to be closed," he said.

He said the agency has worked with council to co-ordinate temporary traffic management between the two projects that minimises disruption to road users and community.

'Shut down the chatter' with sound

Nutting through the chatter of modern day life starts with sound.

The Thames Community Centre's new health and wellbeing programme, facilitated by its creative therapist Dianne McLean, aims to carve out space in the mind and shut down noise by using sound bath meditation.

It's an ancient practice based on the idea that sound vibrations and frequencies can have a healing effect on the mind and body, Dianne said, and restore a sense of balance and

wellbeing.
"I first found out about it as most people do by going to a sound journey and experiencing it first hand.

At that stage I didn't know about the science or the theory behind it, but the wonderful feeling of calm and peace at the end really left an impression on me," she told *The*

Profile.

"Much later, I began my studies to qualify as a creative therapist and we studied sound healing as part of that. That was when I really began to understand the 'why' of how it works on the mind and body, and can produce such profound effects for people." Kicking off this Friday, Feb-

ruary 14, at the centre at 609 Mackay St, Thames, Dianne said people attending the sound bath meditations could

Explore best of district 'and beyond'

The Echo Walking Festival is inviting people to "explore the best of the Hauraki-Thames Valley and beyond" this April.

Running from April 1 to 22, and with more than 45 guided walks, the Echo Walking Festival is a non-profit event organised by town promoters within the district.

A spokesperson said whether a participant was looking for a family-friendly outing, a chance to dive into local history, or a challenging climb, the festival had "something for everyone".

"For those craving adventure, Echo features some of the most rewarding hikes in the

'The Waiotahi to Karaka Loop, led by the Kauaeranga Tramping Club, winds through regenerating bush, past goldmining relics, and up to the stunning Red Rocks Bluff with expansive valley views.

The Maratoto Wires Track follows the historic telephone line through rugged terrain, offering a remote backcountry experience with steep climbs and breathtaking scenery, they said.

"The Pinnacles Walk, one of the most spectacular hikes in the North Island, follows a historic packhorse route, leading trampers through kauri logging country before reaching

unbeatable summit views over the Coromandel.'

Beyond the big hikes, the festival also offers walks suited for all ages and abilities, they said.

"Hall's Arboretum, guided by archaeologist Dave Wilton, explores a historic forestry site home to both exotic and native trees that played a key role in shaping New Zealand's forestry

policy. "The Waihī Cemetery Walk tells the stories of the remarkable women who helped shape the town, offering a moving glimpse into the past.

"The Opoutere Beach and Forest Walk is a peaceful, family-friendly journey along one of the Coromandel's most tranquil beaches, with a return loop through native forest and the opportunity to spot nesting seabirds."

Every walk in the festival will be guided, which meant there would be no need for participants to "worry about maps or navigation".

They were encouraged to just "turn up and follow the lead".

"These walks provide a safe and engaging way to explore, learn about the region's history and ecology, and connect with like-minded adventurers," the spokesperson said. "Whether you're an experienced tramper or simply looking to spend more time outdoors, this festival is the perfect way to step into nature.

Thames boy in the thick of Tarawera eruption



As part of a Valley Profile series, MEGHAN HAWKES explores our local history by seeking out stories of life and death in the Thames Valley

PART ONE

A tremendous noise reminiscent of a cannon blast shook the Thames Valley in the early hours of June 10, 1886.

By dawn news had filtered through that the sound had been the violent eruption of Mt Tarawera around 10 miles from the village of Te Wairoa, near Rotorua.

The village, with its hotels and stores, was the gateway to the Eighth Wonder of the World – the pink and white terraces on the shores of Lake Rotomahana – stunning stairways of silica descending into thermal springs.

When daylight came, smoke and steam rising from the neighbourhood of the massive explosion could be distinctly seen from the top of Thames Valley ranges. Dust and ashes fell as far as Te Aroha and Karangahake.

Telegrams detailing the disaster caused great alarm and

the *Thames Advertiser* office was besieged by an anxious throng. One victim was said to be Miss Bagnall of Turua but proved not be. Mr Crosbie, of Thames, who had been working at Tikitere on a new hotel had a narrow escape.

But somewhere in the mid-

But somewhere in the middle of the disaster was Charles 'Charlie' Sutherland Haszard, a five-year-old boy from Thames. Around 10 days earlier,

Around 10 days earlier, strange disturbances on Lake Tarawera had unnerved local Māori. Tourists were taken across the lake to the geothermal wonderland by guides in canoes or whaleboats.

A short walk over a land bridge to Lake Rotomahana was rewarded by the sight of the White Terrace, a large formation covering three hectares resembling cascading water turned to stone descending 30 metres.

They then crossed Lake Rotomahana to the salmon coloured Pink Terrace which descended about 22 metres over 100 metres. Tourists bathed in the Pink Terrace pools which had various temperatures and depths.

But by 1872 the Pink Terrace was being greatly spoiled by visitors scribbling their names on it, and the tourism in general was infuriating Tūhoto Ariki, the tribal priest of Te Wairoa. Believed to be 100 years old, he came from a long line of high priests and was both respected and feared.

He was said to have powers over the air and the underworld and the tribe, afraid of him, treated him as an outcast.

him, treated him as an outcast. Te Wairoa Māori charged £2 to be rowed across Lake Rotomahana and £5 to make a sketch or take a photograph.

The tribe became prosperous but with this came greed and the ravages of alcohol.

Tūhoto predicted disaster but was ignored.

The principal guide was Sophia Hinerangi, who had taken thousands of tourists over the lake to the terraces. In late July 1886, while ferrying a small group across the lake, the waters suddenly rose and an eeric whimporing sound and heard

whimpering sound was heard.
The group then saw another canoe in the distance which appeared to be a large war canoe, full of Māori dressed for a fu-

neral, some with the heads of dogs and others with their hair detailed with feathers of the Huia and White Heron.

It came near enough for Mrs Sise of Dunedin to see the sun glittering on a paddle.

It was hailed but there was no answer and the phantom canoe then vanished.

Young Charlie Haszard was blissfully unaware of the strange phenomenon occurring at Te Wairoa.

His mother, Janet, had died suddenly the year before at Thames leaving her husband, William, with six children under the age of 12.

Now Charlie was staying with his father's brother, Charles and his family at Te Wairoa.

Several branches of the Haszard family had immigrated to New Zealand from Prince Edward Island, Canada.

Starting in 1859, several voyages were made in ships specifically constructed for the migration.

Charles and his wife Amelia, who were second cousins, initially lived in Bombay, Auckland eventually settling at Te Wairoa where Charles became headmaster of the Maori school.

They lived in the schoolhouse with their children Clara, 22, Ina, 16, Adolphus, 10, Edna, 6, and Mona, 4. The Haszards also took in guests and on the night of June 9 these were surveyor John Cunningham Blythe and Harry Lundis, his assistant. Old Mary Te Monti, a local Māori woman, was also at the residence.

It was Amelia's birthday and the group enjoyed a pleasant evening ending with the surveyors telling of the occultation of Mars with the Moon.

By 11pm all were in bed but around 1.15am the household was roused by an 'earth quiver' and a rumbling noise. Charles Hazard, going to the verandah, exclaimed it was the most wonderful sight he had ever seen. An ink-black cloud hovered over Mt Tarawera, with lightning and balls of fire shooting out of it.

John Blyth said it was a cloud charged with electricity, but it was something altogether quite different...

It's okay to slow down, but don't stop

It's seven kilometers of pure uphill climb, followed by a punishing descent that feels like your knees are being jackhammered with every step.

Thinking about it now, I wonder why anyone would willingly sign up for that.

Determined, I started run-

ning three to four times a week, gradually building up my stamina.

On January 2, I decided it was time for a test run - not quite the Pinnacles, but a 15-kilometre bush track with less climbing.

Two hours later, I limped back to the car, my knee shot and my body thoroughly spent.

That night, a cold hit me like a freight train and lingered for weeks.

The fallout was bigger than I expected. I stopped exercising altogether, and with that,

my morning routine of reading, reflecting, and moving my body fell apart.

The lack of structure led to a slump that felt harder to climb out of than the trail I'd attempt-

A friend of mine, who's a personal trainer, once said, "You can slow down, but don't stop".

His words came back to me during that slump.

For some of us, a full stop can derail everything. We're like ships: a rudder is useless if the ship isn't moving. Without movement, motivation becomes hard to find.

Eventually, I forced myself back into routine.

I'm running again - though carefully - and slowly rebuilding my habits. My knee still needs time, and my energy isn't fully back, but I already feel worlds better.

For me, those weeks of stopping altogether served as a powerful reminder: it's okay to slow down, but stopping entirely comes at a cost.

Life will throw challenges at us - whether it's injuries, sickness, or setbacks.

But if we can keep moving, even at a slower pace, we'll maintain momentum to steer our way forward.

So, wherever you're at, take the time you need. Slow the pace if you have to. Just don't stop.

Llamas lead trek through farm history

In a small paddock nestled among the hills in Kauaeranga Valley, Lorenza Devcich is feeding her four llamas.

The doe-eyed creatures are eager to come close, and Lorenza chats away to them as we talk

Stella, Fern, Libby and Abby are part of Lorenza's unique menagerie at Devcich Farmstay. They are also the stars of Lorenza's llama treks - a 90-minute walk to a private swimming hole, accompanied by the graceful mammals on leads.

"We follow this tramline up and along the river up to the end of the property, which gives you lovely views looking up to those hills close up," Lorenza says.

"I've been doing it on and off for the guests and it was such a hit, I have decided to open it up a bit, by appointment only."

There's a bit of a scuffle as we talk, while the llamas jockey for position at our buckets. They're real characters, Lorenza says.

"Stella's got a personality of her own and if she decides that she doesn't want to walk, she'll just stop and put the brakes on. And she's even sat down," she says.

"Usually when she sits, I've got to just leave her. There's no way, I've sat on her and all sorts and she won't get up. So we just leave her behind and then she catches up when she's had her little protest.

"But she loves it when we go, I usually walk them up to the swimming hole and she'll get in the water."

Along with the llamas, Lorenza has a herd of Scottish Highland cows, some Damara sheep, and a whole flock of interesting birds - peacocks, partridges, Lady Amherst hens, guinea fowl, golden pheasants, two emus, and a variety of interesting hen breeds.

"I've always liked antiques and character stuff rather than modern," she says.

"And with animals and birds, I just like something that's a little bit different, you know, that you don't see on a farm every day."

The whole farm is filled with things you don't see every day.

A category one historical property, it was established by Lorenza's grandfather Simun and his two brothers when they immigrated from Dalmatia, Croatia, in the early 1900s. Simun and his family ran a number of enterprises on the property. Lorenza returned to Thames in 2005 to help her father, and has been working hard ever since on restoring and repairing the original buildings.

"When I first took over, you couldn't walk around this island in the middle," she says of the toolshed.

"It was full of rubbish. I had a big skip out there and all the bent pipe and the rusty nails and stuff that couldn't be used or wasn't antique - out it went. I had three piles: rubbish, antiques, stuff I could use.

"I think I've improved it, if anything. Hopefully keep the history going for a bit longer."

There's a woolshed, kauri mill, toolshed, blacksmithery, and winery on the premises, alongside the three-bedroom homestead and a one-bedroom cottage. Lorenza has memories of the mill running as late as the 80s, and she worked in the winery as a child.

"My father, Ivan, [was] a winemaker. This particular CONTINUED ON P11

shed was built in 1931," she says.

"My job was filling the bottles or cleaning them. And it was dreadful stuff, even as a teenager. I couldn't stand it."

Also onsite is a trading post, looking just as it would have 100 years ago.

"My grandfather would trade with the gum diggers and the loggers in the camps up by the Pinnacles," she says as we poke around in the trading post among ancient tools and dusty bottles.

"A lot of them didn't have any money so he'd give it to them on credit, and then he'd buy the gum back."

We emerge into the sunshine once more to watch Lorenza's birds stroll around the lawns, and the llamas

crowding around the fence across the way.

Much of the charm of the place, it seems, comes from Lorenza herself full of stories of her family and history that brings the place to life.

I came back to Thames in 2005 when Dad's health started failing. When I got back home I thought, this isn't such a bad place to be. I felt at peace actually," she says.

"It's a lot of work and [the animals] keep me really busy [but] I'm just about to the stage now that I'm happy with it.

"I've done my bit with it, saving most of the buildings, working harder than I ever have."

Velvetleaf a risk to all landowners who crop - WRC

Any farmer who harvests or buys crops risks inviting one of the world's most invasive pest plants on to their property to their detriment.

Velvetleaf, which is spread by machin-ery or via contaminated maize, is currently found on 105 properties in nine regions of the North Island: 61 in the Waikato, 20 in Auckland, 15 in Manawatū-Whanganui, three in Hawke's Bay, two in Wellington, and one each in Northland, Taranaki, Gisborne and Bay of Plenty. North Island velvetleaf co-ordinator

Sally Linton said the issue was that farmers bought maize from all over the country and even internationally, often sight unseen, and contractors who harvested crops often worked multiple properties across large areas.

"It's so invasive that if your neighbour has it and you are sharing equipment then you're likely to get it if that machine is not cleaned. To be honest, no farmer that crops is free from risk — and that is the message we need to get out. Biosecu-rity starts at the gate. It'll save you a lot of headaches.

Velvetleaf was first found in New Zealand in the early 2000s, with infestations of the cropping weed mostly concentrated around Auckland and Waikato. Its prevalence was exacerbated by the fod-der beet incursion of 2016-17 and there

"The discovery of velvetleaf on a property can significantly impact farming businesses as cropping is difficult and more costly," Sally said. "So, while there are rules to prevent its spread from properties, we also do everything we can to support landowners who are affected.'

Landowners are responsible for de-stroying velvetleaf, which is an unwanted organism under the Biosecurity Act, and all machinery leaving an infested property must be cleaned.

Judd's awkward lump



Meet Judd, (pictured below), a 9-year-old black mastiff who recently visited our Waihi clinic as his owners had noticed a lump on his left hind foot. Upon his initial visit, a sample from the lump

was taken using a small needle to extract cells, which were then examined under a microscope. The diagnosis was a Mast Cell Tumour (MCT), a potentially malignant type of growth. They account for approximately 20 per cent of skin masses and can occur anywhere. Given the nature of MCTs, surgical removal was rec-

Surgery to remove the tumour took place the following week. Typically, wide margins are taken around such tumours, but this was impossible due to its location on Judd's foot. The limited spare skin meant the incision couldn't

be fully closed, leaving a portion of the wound open. Judd's foot was carefully bandaged to cover the open wound, and the area was monitored and rebandaged every 4-5 days. The MCT was sent to the lab to ensure the whole mass had been removed and to grade the tumour.

Judd's owners did a great job with his care after the surgery, ensuring his bandage stayed clean and dry. The wound healed within approximately three weeks, throughout which Judd was a fantastic patient, sitting calmly through every bandage change, enjoying treats and head scratches. The lab results brought great news: the entire tumour had been successfully removed, and it was classified as low grade, meaning it was unlikely to have spread (metastasised) or recur in the same spot.

Judd's story highlights the importance of get-ting skin lumps checked promptly. Early detection and treatments stay healthy and happy.





tary is combining their two regular events, the Vintage and Classic Car Show and the V8 Show, into one big extravaganza.
Vintage, classic and V8 cars will

be on display along with trucks, pickups, hotrods, bikes, caravans and other vehicles of interest

The annual swapmeet will take place at the same time, with stallholders bringing their vehicle-related wares. There will be market and food stalls, activities, dem-onstrations, kid's entertainment, raffles, and the much-sought-after prizes for each car category.

To keep the crowd entertained, Rotary have called on some 50s-themed entertainment - rock'n'roll dancers, a pin-up fashion show, and Paeroa's own Elvis, Trevor Needham.

"I'm going to bring several eras of Elvis through the decades, from about 1960 up until when he passed in 1977. We're going to doing some country music as

well," Trevor said.
"I'm really hoping that we can make it something to remember.

Trevor will be wearing three different costumes during the show, each weighing 15kg and worth around \$5000. He said he was excited to bring his show back to his

"I lived in Paeroa for a long time and to bring this [show] home again, it touches me," Trevor said.

"It's important for people to know how much I love being a part of that community and now to come back with this show after all

these years, it's a big part of me." Rotary president Katie McLaren said the car show was shaping up to be a fantastic day, and said combining the two events made sense.

"The capacity of the club is

changing - a lot of people were getting sick and retiring and going away, so we just thought we'd combine it into just having one event per year, one big car event, one big fundraiser," she said.

The show will be Rotary's major

fundraiser for the year, allowing the club to continue supporting the community in Paeroa, Waihī and the Plains.

"A lot of our funding goes to-wards supporting youth, so we have put a fair amount of money into the local schools and college," Katie said.

"Before Christmas we agreed to give some money to Paeroa Central School towards their new playground surfaces; the Ohinemuri Kahui Ako towards a youth sup-port programme, [and] we've provided some funding towards the Paeroa College Academic Scholar-ships as well as some funding to the Santa Parade for the Business Association.



If there's one thing Danika Bergersen learned about herself during a BMX competition last month, it's that she knows how to persevere.

"I don't back down from challenges easily," she said.

It's something that propelled the 15-year-old bicycle motocross racer to the top in the Eastern Region BMX Track Attack Series for 2025 held in Melbourne, Australia, January 11-19. from

The young athlete, who rode in the 16-year-old girls' group, competed in 21 races across six different tracks in Melbourne, and claimed victory in every single one of her

races, clinching first place in the competition for her age

group.

The champion arrived at the competition with no expectations, and tations, and even though she was happy with the results, it all

came as "a bit of a shock", she said.

10 student, told The Profile it was a confidence boost to ride with new competitors and in different environments, which she called "that unknown ele-

around 11pm.

races but they often finish before it gets too dark.

Danika also had an "amazing opportunity" to take part in a coaching session with 2024 Paris Olympics gold medal winner and French rider Joris Daudet, and a second coaching session with Australian BMX Olympian Izaac Kennedy, she

said.

But her victory lap doesn't end there.

Hot on the heels of her first Track Attack Series win abroad, Danika headed back to New Zealand to start the new school year, continue BMX training and to compete in another competition.
On February 2, the rising

BMX star competed in the 2025 Oceania BMX Championships in New Plymouth, where she claimed another first place victory in the 16-year-old girls' cat-

egory. The racing prodigy said this was a major event where top riders from anywhere in Oceania went to compete and she was

happy she achieved the title.

The next thing Danika was working towards was the BMX New Zealand National Championships in Invercargill from March 21-23, she said

But two dream goals for Dan-ika were to continue having fun while competing, and also to be able to "give back to the sport" by coaching some of the younger riders, she said.
