Pritish architect and television presenter George Clarke has thrown his support behind Whiritoa Lifeguard Service's clubhouse rebuild - calling on people to chip in with the form desired effects. in with the fundraising efforts while visiting the coastal Hauraki town.

Known for transforming Amazing Spaces, Clarke helped raise awareness and support for the club's project - which aims to create a modern facility to better serve the local community and lifesaving efforts - by sharing a video of him bolstering up the rebuild and sharing his "deep" con-

"This building has been here since the 1970s; it was actually built around the same month and the same year that I was born," he said. "And my connection with it is actually quite deep because my aunty and uncle just live a few hundred yards up the road - I convinced them to buy a place here, because I wanted them to have this beautiful coastline.

"Unfortunately, the building needs to go," he explained. "We need to build a brand new struc-

The project was born out of a need to address the current facilities at Whiritoa as they were no

longer fit for purpose.

According to the service, the clubhouse development would address the current and future needs. for surf lifesaving at Whiritoa Beach, as well as support wider Whiritoa community groups with "a well-designed, modern, weathertight, and safe facility that caters to all visitors to the beach and club members – ensuring another 50 plus years of useful community use and lifesaving service".

A fundraising page set up to assist the project said \$1,842,709 of its \$5m target had been raised as

at February 17.
"Clearly, this is a significant sum of money and great care will be exercised in all aspects of ex-penditure," the service said. "Our building committee, comprising of industry experts, has been established to ensure value for money and materials are used that will stand the test of time."

Clarke's video was posted on the Whiritoa Lifeguard Service's Facebook page on February 10, and club chairperson Patrina Kerr told The Profile they were "incredibly appreciative" of the TV personality's support.
"At the moment, the video has

just gone out through our social media channels. It hasn't been

posted on George's social media channels as of yet, so once that happens, I think we're expecting a greater influx [of donations]. But people were pretty excited to see the video," she said, "and they've shared that amongst their net-works, so it has filtered out a little bit wider than what a normal post would do for us.

"We're very grateful and appreciative of George's support, and we're excited to see the results when it does go out through George's channels as well."

Clarke, who is known for his television series George Clarke's Amazing Spaces - which has been running since 2012 - also posted to his 246,000 Instagram followers a framed '50 Years' memorabilia print gifted to him by the Whiri-toa Lifeguard Service, boasting the blue and yellow colours of the lifeguard's skull caps.
In his video he asked viewers

to support the cause, stating that donating a "couple of dollars" to-wards the rebuild could make a 'massive difference'

He also signed off with a promise. "When we build a new building," he said, "I'll come back and

Boaties, dogs visit pest-free island

oromandel Department of Conser-Cvation staff are "shocked and angered" by a report of two boaties taking their pet dogs ashore one of the district's pest-free conservation islands.

And they're calling on responsible boaties to report other recreational sailors who land on Coromandel's offlimits islands.

DOC's Coromandel operations manager, Nick Kelly, said the most recent incident occurred on Kawhitu/Stanley Island, located northeast of Matarangi, on February 8, and was witnessed by two members of the public who alerted DOC.

"Our informants saw two people - believed to be from a 660 Haines Hunter boat... ashore on Kawhitu," Nick said.

These people were spotted walking along a beach on the island at about 1:30pm with two dogs.

Nick said Kawhitu was classified as Nature Reserve, under the Reserves Act 1977 - meaning no-one can enter without express permission.

"To see people flagrantly disregard the rules - and in this case walk right past a sign telling them they shouldn't be there – is very distressing.

'As well as being somewhere they shouldn't have been, the two people who've landed on Kawhitu have risked

undoing decades of conservation work protecting vulnerable species.

'They've also risked the biosecurity of the island, which is protected through strict protocols we place on our own staff and any visitor authorised to carry out work on Kawhitu."

Nick encouraged the owner or skipper of the the boat – or anyone who saw the people from the vessel go ashore - to contact DOC on o800 DOC HOT, and quote CLE-8615.

Roughly 86 ha in size, Kawhitu is a haven for a number of protected and threatened species, including tieke/ saddlebacks, flesh-footed shearwaters/ toanui, and kakariki/red-crowned par-






Not So Good

A familiar face in new shoes at Paeroa College

ndrew Cameron is proud "Paeroa's college".

The newly-appointed principal is not new to the school, having been its deputy principal for eight years already, and he says he's excited to helm the growth of a campus already brimming with "whānau feeling" and community pride.

This place very much feels like a whānau when you're in here and walk around," he said.

We often get comments from outside people who come in about the wairua, the feeling that you get when you walk in, and that's created not just by the space, but because of the people that work here."
That inclusiveness and con-

nection is what Andrew wants to continue fostering at the

To ensure he stays connected with the students, he's even planning on keeping a foot in the classroom, teaching te reo Māori.

"I teach all the new Year 9s, just to ensure that I know them all. It's very strategic," he said.

"I want our kids to feel valued for who they are, what they are, that they're enough. And you just come here and be you, we'll do the rest.'

The school has seen a lot of



growth since Andrew joined its staff - from around 240 stu-

dents to 380 - and with 50 per cent of the roll now made up of Māori students, he said it was also important to continue to weave te ao Māori through the campus.

"You don't have to be a te reo speaker to be passionate about Māori kids and te ao Māori, you just have to want what's best

for the school and for the kids,"

he said.
"I think it's a string to my bow, but that's not why I've gone on the journey I have to learn te reo Māori. I want the speak [it] because the language is beautiful, culture is beautiful, and the more of us that can role model that to the kids, and they're proud and can be themselves at our school, it's only going to mean good things for them and the community.

Andrew said he had a great team behind him, and there was little he planned to change at the college.

His main focus, he said, will be the "core business" of learn-


"Teachers now are asked to do so much... For me, it's about stripping it back, decreasing the noise and the clutter, so that we are just focusing on what you're doing in the classroom as a teacher, because ultimately that's all that really matters," he said.

We're aware of the responsibility that we have, and we want our community to walk alongside us, support us, and we'll do the best for their kids. Because we want them to be valued members of the Paeroa community, whether now or in the future.

We want them to come back to the Hauraki and have that pride in this place, and be a positive contribution to the community."

np track first of its kind for Hauraki

fully-accessible pump track Afully-accessible pump track soon-to-be-constructed in Waihī will be the first of its kind in the Hauraki district, with a wheelchair-friendly design and a circuit suitable for champion-

And still, there's more to come. The track is part of a new Out-door Recreation Hub to be situated in Morgan Park. It is the first aspect of the multi-stage project to be constructed, with a powhiri held on February 10 to mark the occasion.

"It's taken us a while to get here, so the forum is very ex-cited that work will start," Waihī Community Forum chairperson Bindy Burke said.

This is Stage One of the hub, and the forum is now focusing on securing consents and external funding for Stage Two - a new skate park, BBQ area and exercise area.

The establishment of a recreation hub has been a community initiative spearheaded by the Waihī Community Forum since 2021, in partnership with Hauraki District Council.

It has been involved in several successful community projects in Waihī, all designed to enhance the town. Past initiatives include murals, creating a 3×3 basketball area, and the community playground at Waihī East School.

The pump track design was chosen by the community during the forum's public consulta-tion period. It will be wheelchair-

friendly and include a beginners circuit for those just starting out. as well as a main track suitable for both training and racing.
"This is one of the most excit-

ing projects I've been involved in because it has been such an inclusive community initiative," forum member and Waihī ward councillor Anne Marie Spicer said. "The forum has received fantastic input from students, families, older residents, groups and organisa-tions, whose ideas have helped shape the vision for this hub. The support from local and national

funders has also been incredible."
The forum secured funding from external funding providers to get the facility constructed, including contributions from Lot-teries Commission, OceanaGold, Valder Ōhinemuri Trust, Lions Club, and the Lion Foundation. Cr Spicer told The Profile that

the hub's location in Morgan Park would make it an "easily accessible and open, safe space where people of all ages can come to-

There will also be a third and fourth stage of the hub's overall development. Stage Three will see the central area and playground established, while Stage Four will feature a public toilet and car park upgrade.

said the transformation of Morgan Park, off Kenny St, would establish a "recreation destination for locals and visitors alike".

"Beyond the obvious recreational benefits, this project has the potential to foster community connection, attract tourism, and contribute to the economic vitality of Waihī and the wider region something we're proud to sup-

port."
The contractors aim to have the pump track completed by the end of April, weather permitting.

RESPONSE

The letter from Matthew White on mining needs a response on points of fact. The protest at Waihi regarding the Minerals Strategy was not a

Greenpeace event, it was organised by local group Coromandel Watchdog of Hauraki, and supported by people from across the Peninsula including from Waihi town. He asks how is gold mining toxic? Gold is bound up with heavy metals in quartz reefs in our area. To extract the gold, the heavy metals must be crushed up in the process. These metals are toxic for hundreds of years - see arsenic, lead, cadmium, zinc and more. Right now artificial mountains of this waste sit behind Waihi - the short term risk is low but long term risks of tailings dam failure are high, note the "orange river" last year when a very small old mine leached metals into the Ohinemuri River and elevated arsenic levels (not just in water, as plants like water cress uptake arsenic). I understand his points about jobs but we have to create jobs that protect the environment and we can - we can mine e-waste (see cell phones etc) and reuse gold endlessly without digging up under our conservation land or our houses! Our most precious resources are clean water and healthy soils, not foreign companies making millions out of places like Waihi. Where are the golden streets and first class facilities after 30 years of mining? And where are sustainable jobs once the mining companies have taken the gold? And by the way, let's have a debate about the future of work and the land without personal insults regarding our age and identity. I realise the Minister of Resources thinks it's great to personally attack people who disagree with him but we can do better than that.



Vord on the street: what Waihī really thin

Mining has long been synonymous with Waihī, from the first gold discovery on Pukewa Hill in the 1870s. Yet when Minister Shane Jones arrived on January 31 to announce the government's new mining strategy, he was met with a large throng of protesters against the industry.

With these conflicting opinions hitting the spotlight, *The Profile* wanted to know what everyday people in Waihī think of mining. We canvassed the main street on a busy Tuesday morning, and found most were proud of their town's

history.

"It's employment for people.

Without that, there wouldn't be
Waihi. My husband and I both think it's good for the town - if it wasn't there, Waihī would be dead," Karen said.

Up near the pumphouse, a large

group of women were waiting for friends. Lynette, Kay and Josie said the mine was the backbone of the town. "We love it. If you don't love mining, don't move to Waihī. In a perfect world, no one would want it, but it brings money to the town. It's been here for years, they said.

think in this day and age, the gold companies are aware of the environment, and they're very respectful of it too. Sometimes I think they're more aware of the environment than the protesters, because the protesters go and walk all over the bush with their signs and everything, and they drive around in electric cars and

with cellphones and wear jewellery. At least we're not hypocrites." Some passers-by were fairly cir-

cumspect. Margy, a visitor from Whangamatā, said while she wor-ried about the environment, it was hard to justify being concerned when mining was doing so much for employment.

just think it's good for the country if it's going to boost our economy. Which is totally wrong, probably," she said.

Another, anonymous bystander was more vocal about his dislike.

"If things are all equal and to

help the environment, they need to be held accountable... I'm sure Waihī has more environmental issues regarding mining than any

other district in New Zealand."

For Brian, mining was a tricky issue. "I have my foot in both camps. I vote Green, but I'm okay about mining in Waihī, because this traditionally is a mining town. I do worry about what profits we get out of it, what royalties they actually pay," he said.

"It's nice to have a pretty lake, but more could be done around here. The new opencast is pretty close to where I live. I just want to see a benefit from it."

For the relatively few people

who disagreed completely with mining, it was money at the top of their minds.

"I don't like it - it all goes out to Australia instead of coming back into town. Where's all the gold go-Joan asked.

ing?" Joan asked.
"New Zealand needs to open their eyeballs up and stop selling everything off. Gold is a commodity that you do not want to get rid of, you want to keep it in New Zealand," Veronica agreed.

Bedset

It was safety that was Rob's

main concern, however.
"I think that without the mines, Waihī wouldn't be what it is," he said. "One area of concern I've got is with the Martha Mine, they're planning on filling it full of wa-ter. I just think it's going to be too deep. I worry about the water level

with the primary school over the road... [but] I don't object to them extending."

One thing almost everyone agreed on was the support the mining operation offered to the community.

"They provide a lot for the school. They provide scholarships for academics and trades. They run a driving programme that helps people get their restricted, which is cool as well. It brings so much money in for the town," said Izzie and Evah, who had wandered down from Waihī College

"They give a lot of money to the schools, any community events you apply to OceanaGold for funding and they will contribute. Peo-ple don't realise what else they do. If they left tomorrow, everybody would feel it," said the women's group.

The final word went to Pop, as he whizzed down the street on his motorised scooter.

"I don't care. You're not going to stop the Americans from doing it,' he said.

"It's had its ups and downs. Sometimes it's good - they did the road up, there's one consolation about it."

Eruption causes house collapse, 'living nightmare

Part One was published in the Febru-ary 11 issue of The Valley Profile

The children were wakened and everybody dressed before gathering in the sitting room. It was thought to be the safest part of the building, being constructed

A fire was lit in the stove and the group sat down in the middle of the room. Amelia with all the children around her. Out the window was a great sheet of fire and there were shocks of earthquake every 10 minutes.

Clara calmly sat down at the harmonium and played and sang

At 3am a rattling noise similar to stones pattering on a roof top began. The noise became so great they could not hear each other speak. Harry Lundis picked up a piece of the debris and the horri-fying conclusion was made that it was lava and that Tarawera was

erupting. The volcanic shower continued to pour on the house for about an hour. A tremendous wind then rose and came down with such force that they were nearly suffocated with smoke.

At about 4am the walls began bulging inwards. Suddenly there came a tremendous crash and the roof fell in on top of the group. Clara, who had been near the surveyors, put out her hands in the dark and grasped John's hand on one side and on the other, Harry's.

Lava fell on their heads. Harry smashed the window, cutting his hand very badly, and had to use

his foot to kick out the remaining

Once outside he pulled Clara and John out. A great quantity of blue clay was falling and it was

In the open they were struck with lumps of lava so ran into another portion of the house and shut the door. But the roof was bulging down and the other rooms were inaccessible so they opened the door and stood in the doorway ready to escape. The house then appeared to be struck by lightning and burning lava and it caught fire.

The trio ran for some other shel-



ter, stumbling through a paddock of uprooted trees in the darkness. They found the henhouse still standing and took refuge there.

Of those who had been assembled in the middle of the room when the building collapsed, Old Mary, leaning against the door-post of a bedroom, snatched Ina into the bedroom where they crawled under a washstand.

After a while, the mud which had been raining down on them stopped and they managed to clear away with their hands the debris covering them. They got themselves upright and waited in the dark.

Amelia, sitting in her chair with her three youngest children around her, was pinned to the floor by her leg when the roof fell in. Young Charlie was likely with his Uncle Charlie while Amelia protected their children. Forty seven-year-old Charles was struck and killed by the roof caving in, falling close to the stove and half across an ottoman. Charlie too was killed alongside his uncle in the roof fall. Amelia endured a horrific living nightmare as her small children died, one on each

side of her and one in her arms.

In the henhouse Clara, John and Harry watched the house with great anxiety, remaining there until daylight when help came. Old Mary and Ina were found in the corrugated iron portion of the house and rescued through a win-

Everyone listened for sounds of life in the collapsed building, but there was nothing, just 85ft of mud and debris on the fallen roof. The girls were taken to safety and a party of searchers returned to begin digging at the house. They uncovered Amelia Haszard, astonishingly still alive after hours of entombment. She, Ina and Clara were the only Haszard family survivors. The surveyors John Blyth and Harry Lundis also survived, as well as Old Mary.

The Tarawera eruption lasted six hours, causing massive destruction. Several villages were wiped out as well as the famous Pink and White Terraces. Around 120 people died, mostly Māori. Te Wairoa later became a tourist attraction known as 'The Buried Village'

inquest found Charles Haszard and some of his family accidentally came by their death by the falling of a house caused by

a volcanic eruption. Charles and his children are buried together at Rotorua cemetery. His Thames nephew, although mentioned on the Haszard gravestone, was buried separately; his small headstone poignantly inscribed 'Little Charlie'.

Revolver needed for races

Funny isn't it, how life seemed so much simpler in days gone by, and thus arguably more enjoyable. The Thames Races were a very big deal in Thames early January each year, and

January each year, and big crowds of locals and holiday makers attended filling the stand, and grounds, with their big umbrellas, gazebos, and deck chairs. Hoping to win on the horses, but also hoping to win some flounder, with many draws throughout the day. A lot of money went through the tote on site, with a dozen TAB windows often having queues. And thus a lot of money was held there

of money was held there.

At the end of the day, we were tasked with getting the old steel revolver out of the Police station safe, with five bullets, (in different pockets) and being dropped up at the tote by the station police car, and accompanying the TAB manager, in his car with a boot full of money in metal cases to the BNZ bank staff who opened for us. We were thanked then everyone went off in their various directions. The Police car picked us up and the gun had to be duly returned to its safe. Funnily in those days the banks were also allowed to have a revolver and a few bullets, under the counter at the bank.

at the bank.

When I was stationed in Hamilton a few years before, we went in and checked their operativity from time to time, and the bank staff were supposed to have training in safe-ty operating a revolver. However, things hit the fan a few years later, when staff, playing around, accidently discharged the weapon and a round went through the roof, so firearms were later removed from banks, (much to the relief of bank robbers I imagine!).

I hadn't been in the Police long and was sta-

I hadn't been in the Police long and was stationed in Hamiton when the Senior Sergeant instructed me to draw a station revolver and five bullets, and that I would be taken to the BNZ, and accompany a consignment of money to Auckland. His instruction: "Put the gun in one pocket, bullets in the other, under NO CIRCUMSTANCES WERE THE ROUNDS TO BE self, because I had just left the Regular Army and transferred over to the Territorial Army with weekly trainings! However, I sat in the back of a hot stuffy truck for the trip, sitting from memory on what I remember as being wire-wrapped cartons of about \$4 million.

It was actually a lovely aspect to old time policing; the variety of duties was mind boggling. So much was left for the policeman on duty to deal with. The decisions were his or hers to make, to prosecute or not to prosecute. To arrest or not to arrest. Police had the ability, especially in rural areas of the country, to do what was best (in their view) for the offender, as well as the victim. At times there were offenders who just admitted everything and seemed quite regretful, and on the odd occasion victims who were very cagey and suspicious, leading to one questioning how much they were claiming from insurance! I did enjoy relieving at Whitianga when Con-stable Dave Wall went on leave.

He had a huge area to cover as there was no station, or Police in Tairua or Pauanui in those days. In the middle of the night it was a hell of a drive to get to Tairua quickly in a call out in your own car (there were no one-man stations with Police cars in those days - the cop had to use his own on mileage)

Dave had his own cannabis patch growing in his vegetable garden at the side of the station house. One plant was nearly 1.5 metres high. I asked Dave why, and he said the school station visits got shown what the plant looked like so they could report if seeing it. He grew them, until one night someone came and stole every one, so Dave never replanted after that! I had a lot of respect for Dave, a won-derful community policeman, he was also the St John "Zambuck" first aid man at the rugby on a Saturday. A wonderful example. It was a on a Saturday. A wonderful example. It was a relief however, when Police set up in Tairua later, about 1983, and Constable Nig PakiPaki stationed himself there. I had to race over there late one night and call him out. He got dressed, grabbed his revolver from a shelf above the back door - that's where he kept the station firearm, fully loaded on that shelf! He was a really amazing, effective, and popular policeman. lar policeman. - Ron Agnew, former Thames Police officer

Collaboration with Medical Centres



Event marks 'helter skelter' gold rush stampede

In 1875, it was hoped that the Ohinemuri Goldfield would be

the "new Eldorado".

A reporter for The Thames
Advertiser, as compiled in The
Ohinemuri Regional Historical
Journal, noted "wild scenes unprecedented in these parts" as eagar diggers dashed madly across ger diggers dashed madly across the river in the Karangahake Gorge, on horse and foot, awaiting the following day's proclamation - the opening of the Ohinemuri


What occurred on March 3, 1875, described as a "stampede" of those hoping to secure goldrich ground, marked the beginning of the Karangahake and Mackaytown communities, and next month an event will be held to commemorate it.
The Karangahake Hall Com-

mittee is acknowledging 150 years since the Ōhinemuri Goldfields in the gorge opened up to prospectors with a historic showcase on

March 9.

"I think it's important to mark this occasion because it is such a big number - 150 years," hall secretary Aura Hurrell told *The Profile*

"We found out about the anniversary just before Christmas so [there was] not a lot of time to organise anything like the 1975 centenary celebration, but we really felt it should be acknowledged. We have such a great community here in Karangahake and Mackaytown, with many family ties that go back generations and lots of wonder-

ful 'new blood' too... We wanted to acknowledge the milestone and honour our heritage by keeping the memory alive of what went on here over the years to make it the special place it is today.

In 1975, the Paeroa, Karanga-hake, and Mackaytown communities went to a "great effort" to commemorate the 100 year anniversary of the stampede. Aura said, with a full re-enactment, period fancy dress, and a hangi put on by the local marae.

The event on March 9 this year would be an "informal get together where people can come along and read about the local history and

view the photos," she said.

According to the Ōhinemuri
Journal, on the morning of March
3, 1875, there was a "mounting
impatience" as the hundreds of
prospectors awaited the opening
of what they finally boned would of what they finally hoped would prove "the new Eldorado"

"As the hour approached, the excitement intensified; impatience was visible on every face. Some were already mounted on horses, ready to rush towards the site of the prospector's claim, to secure ground close to it," the reporter

"The helter skelter across the Ōhinemuri River, which was unavoidable, was perhaps the most amusing, and was watched with great interest by numbers who stationed the most age to a left of the left. tioned themselves on the hill for that purpose.

"In some cases, men could be seen swimming across, miner's right in hand, to gain the opposite bank in advance of others.

"Others would attempt to run over the slippery boulders, and through the strong stream, whilst others again would run and swim alternately.
"Some swam horses at another

place to a steep bank, where they dismounted and went straight up. How they managed to grasp



scrub and fern, and so reach the summit, was perhaps a marvel to themselves after it was all over.


Aura said the things she found most fascinating about this piece of history was how industrious people were back in 'the years of the gold': 1875-1935. "The other thing I am really im-

pressed about is how much effort was put into the 1975 centenary celebrations - a combined effort by the Paeroa Drama Society, The Paeroa and District Centennial Committee, local Iwi and many volunteers from town. The NZ Army even got involved and pro-vided uniforms for the actors."

The Karangahake Hall Committee's historical shWWowcase will be held at the hall on Sunday, March 9 from 10-2pm. Records will cover the original stampede and the 'Years of the Gold', the centenary celebrations in 1975, The Karangahake School history, and the build - and rebuild - of the Karangahake Hall.

Catchment group eyes Hauarahi Stream

The Western Firth Catchment Group is holding an informational afternoon and barbecue for landowners on The Western Firth Catchment Group March 7, with an eye to improving water quality in the area.

Landowners in the Kaiaua and surrounding area are invited to the Hauraki Golf Club, where the catchment group will provide updates on the current state of the area's waterways. There will also be guest speakers with information on dos and don'ts and relevant future legislation.

The group, which was formed by landowners seven years ago, proactively manages streams within the catch-

"At the time Living Water, a DOC/ Fonterra partnership, had identified the catchment area behind the Miranda bird sanctuary as an area needing da bird sanctuary as an area needing stream mitigation to protect the wading birds," catchment group chair Peter Roberts said.

"We worked with Living Water for the next five years and did significant stream planting and monitoring in that

area.
"We also partnered with Ecoquest from Kaiso partiered with Ecoquest from Kaisua, who have been doing stream sampling in three streams. We are now seeing long term trends of the effects of stock exclusion and planting. Another part of our work is installing silt traps on the ephemeral stream to reduce the silt entering the main streams.

The group also implements a biose-

curity programme targeting pests such as rats, stoats and possums.

This year, the trust plans to focus on the Hauarahi Stream in Kaiaua.

"We have already done a lot of planting and stream clearance in the lower reaches and are about to begin the next stage in the Kaiaua domain," Peter said.

"This involves digger work, fencing and planting. We are working with the Hauraki District Council, Waikato Regional Council and iwi on this project. Funding for this project is mainly from the Aotearoa Gaming Trust and Hauraki District Council.

Volunteers and donations are always welcome, the trust said, to ensure it can continue to improve the quality of water in the catchment.







Work to begin on storm-damaged Waihī road

Work to repulse the Second of Golden Valley Rd in Waihī that collapsed after heavy rains in May, 2023, will begin this week.

Hauraki District Council Mayor Toby Adams said the rebuild would be welcome news for local residents.

"It's been a big exercise to align budgets, design and contractors, so we're very pleased to see this work get the green light," he said.

The rebuild repairs a five metre deep slip which removed approximately 66 metres of the road. There was a total of three slips which made Golden Valley Rd impassable for pedestrians and vehicles at the Landlyst Rd

To reduce the chance of a repeat event at the site, the rebuild includes a 125 metre road realignment along with retaining walls, backfilling and earthworks. Contractor Ventia Ltd planned to establish on site on February 17. The planned completion date is April 9, excluding any unforeseen rain days or underground surprises.

We know the length of time between the road collapse and start of the repair has been considerable," council group services manager Adrian de Laborde said. "The difficulty was that the storm damage was not as a direct result of Cyclone Gabrielle, the government's repair fund for that event. It's taken a bit to balance the books but now that we've got a full budget approved, we're eager to get going.

There were no drive way accesses in this stretch of damaged Golden Valley Rd so residents have had access to their properties at all times, council said.

"It's been a long haul and everyone will be very happy to see this road re-established, Mayor Adams said.

Our thanks to the local residents and community for their patience and understanding while we've been on this journey. It's a relief to see that the destination is within sight."
