Last year it was held in El Salvador and the year before it was held in Brazil, so it was cool to surf in amazing locations with the best kids from around the world.

NEW ROLES FOR SIMPSON

Coromandel MP Scott Simpson has been appointed Minister for and Minister of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. features, the regional council said. **GOOSE CULL PLANNED**

Thames-Coromandel District Council is planning a cull to manage the goose population in Matarangi. Around 500 geese are causing widespread issues in Matarangi, including a large amount of droppings on sidewalks; damage to landscaping and grassy areas; aggression towards other bird species; and contamination of waterways with waste. The cull will take place at night during this week, with a professional contractor using low-powered ammunition and a silencer to minimise disruption. Temporary signage will be placed at entrances while the work is underway, and all animal remains

will be removed. Council said the cull had been approved by police. SUPER SUNDAY



Ambo station in critical condition close to rebuild

he Waihī St John am-The Wallin St. Station is from con \$111,000 away from completing its vital rebuild, with staff calling on the community to help make it happen, one "111" at a time.

The station on Johnstone

St was run down, earthquake-prone, and no longer fit for purpose, Hato Hone St John group operations manager Coromandel South Julia Te Huia

told *The Profile*.

It's been pulled down to make way for something newa "home away from home" for the staff and volunteers who assist with around 215 callouts every month.

"The station was built some-time back in the 1970s, and over the years it's just become more and more not fit for purpose," Julia said.

"[A new building] will give the staff who are working hard all day every day a nice place to come back to and rest and re-

charge."
The Waihī station has been relocated to a temporary location along Hazard St, but Julia said the timeline for the rebuild - which would be a stateof-the-art premises featuring a new kitchen and restrooms was still on track for being completed by the end of June.

However, though Hato Hone St John has raised more than 75 per cent of the total funds required, it still needed to fun-

They've established a '111' fundraiser to occur throughout the month of March, asking people to challenge themselves to either a single event or a month-long objective

Ideas included: walking, running, or cycling 111kms; completing 111 laps of a pool; sink-

ing 111 balls along a golf course; hitting 111 nails into a wall during a home renovation project; r even baking 111 cupcakes.

Participants can sign up to the Waihī 111 challenge, or do-

nate to the cause, online.

And they didn't have to be local, Julia said.

Emergency medical techni-

cian Dean Moffett agreed that a new state of the art station would allow the staff to maintain their own welfare and wellbeing all year round.
"It will also allow us to comfortably study and develop our

skills to continue delivering life changing interventions to our community and surrounding

It was also a milestone moment for her granddaughter Eliza, who joined the school alongside her grandmother.

Ngaire said.

She's loving it, and it's really special to watch her at school.

Kaihere School is a big part of Ngaire's family history.

She's lived in the rural community for 50 years, and her husband, four children, and one of her elder grandchildren have already passed through its gates.

Now, Ngaire gets to share the grounds with Eliza and another of her granddaughters, Charlotte.

The new role is an exciting opportunity to give back to her local community, Ngaire said.

And she brings with her a wealth of experience, having spent 30 years teaching at Hauraki Plains College - 22 of those as principal - and also previously working at the Education Review Office.

"Living in the community for some time, you have a sense of what the community is about and what I would call the school's DNA," Ngaire said.

"[And] I had 40 schools with

"It gave me a really good insight into what works, what makes them tick.

There's also an advantage in having come from a secondary school environment. Ngaire

said.
"One of the benefits is knowing what the students are going to need, particularly in terms of literacy and numeracy, so that when they do go on to col-lege, they're well prepared," she said.

Mostly though, Ngaire plans to focus on the basics.

"We are about good people working hard.

"We want them to be good, decent human beings, but also working hard at their learning or being a good friend or whatever it is.

"At the same time [I'm] really wanting to expand the curriculum so that even though it's a small school, the students get really good learning opportunities," she said.

"We've got other staff doing other things, a music programme and looking at a science programme, and just making sure that they get the same opportunities and learning experiences as in the bigger schools.

"I think whatever you want for your own grandchild, you want for everyone's grandchild.

"It's something I remind myself often: it's not just about my grandkids, it's about everyone's grandkids."

Hikutaia settlers appeal for new gravel road



As part of a Valley Profile series, **MEGHAN HAWKES** searches through old newspapers to bring you the stories Thames Valley locals once read about themselves.

1908

Hikutaia was a hive of activity with settlers over the bridge by the river bestirring themselves to get the County Council to metal their part of the road to enable them to get their milk to the local creamery instead of taking it up the river to Netherton.

Fred Howes was building a fine residence opposite the railway station, a decision that the local schoolmaster welcomed as the Howes' had several children of school age.

In response to a suggestion that the government purchase the Alley Bros' estate, Mr Bax received a telegram from Prime Minister Joseph Ward stating that owing to government ministers being scattered over the colony, the matter would not be considered until after November's election.

Meanwhile at Paeroa, a startling find was made under

the Choral Hall in Wharf St, a building in which Miss Kenny conducted a private school for young children.

The children were in the habit of playing under the school, and they discovered a package beneath the floor of the building. They tried to knock it down with an old horseshoe, eventually succeeding.

When opened, the package, which weighed about five pounds, was found to contain several plugs of gelignite, some caps, and some fuse.

It was handed over to Constable Henry, who found that it was wrapped in an Auckland Star newspaper of November of the previous year, and over the newspaper was another wrapping on which was a postage date of the same month.

Evidently the package had come through the post, and for some reason had been hidden under the hall.

It was fortunate that the gelignite did not explode when handled by the children, as if it had done so some of them would undoubtedly have been killed and the buildings in the vicinity destroyed.

Over on the newly named Hauraki Plains, previously the Piako Swamp, dredges for cutting canals had arrived.

One of the dredges was fitted up by means of a crane at Thames, which was then able to assist in the putting up of the others.

The first work to be undertaken by the dredges was to commence operations on the canal from Waitakaruru.

Thames, Police Court a 'polished scoundrel', who had been victimising residents received his just desserts. George Allen, alias Captain Nella, alias Chappell and other assumed names, was before the court tor false pretences, and being a rogue and a vagabond. He had played upon the sympathies of many Thames people by telling stories, and had received assistance in cash from several.

He even had the audacity to tell the Inspector of Police that he was going to keep straight. He once attempted to pass himself off at Waihī as the newly-appointed electrician to the Waihī mine. Since 1897 the accused had 28 convictions recorded against him, and served six years in gaol with hard la-

Stormwater an innovative irrigation solution

An innovative solution to bush regeneration and re-silience is being developed for a small stand of mature kahi-

katea trees in Turua.

The aim of the project, a uniquely-designed irrigation system, is to keep the stand healthy, giving its trees the best possible chance of resisting the labely disease. ing dieback disease.

The project is the brainchild of Turua Domain caretaker and committee member Jim

Sutherland.

The aim is to use stormwater collected from the neighbouring Barnados Early Learning Centre to maintain the water table in the domain's fenced-off section of bush at the back of the property, adjacent to Piako and Oparia Rds. The two-acre stand has

around 72 mature kahikatea trees which are roughly 400 years old, along with at least 100 young saplings.

Two 4000-litre water tanks have already been installed behind the Barnados building.

hind the Barnados building.

"They were going to put in an underground tank... That was going to cost them \$15,000," Jim said. "I'd priced our irrigation scheme up to about \$15,000 as well. So they said, 'well, that's pretty easy. We'll just do the irrigation scheme then if the council agrees'.

"Barnardos have been really

good with us, and we've worked with them a lot.

An adjacent shed, funded by a \$700 grant from the Seagull Centre in September last year, will eventually house an irrigation pump, and the committee is now working on pipes to move the water from the tanks to the bush, around 100 metres

The pipes will be connected to a manifold at the treeline, and pumped through hoses laid around the boundary.

"They'll be movable hoses. And we're going to make them out of the fire brigade's [old]

forestry firefighting hose which is made to weep so they don't get burnt when you drag them through the fire, [and] modi-fying those with holes to some degree as soaker hoses," Jim

"So we'll have the pump running, we'll have two or three

But we'll also have the option to bring it around if we do some special planting in some area we want to water.

'Because if we can put more water in here in the summer, [the bush will] generate itself, we won't have to worry about

planting. That's what we want, then we've won the game."

Jim, who formerly worked for the Department of Conservation's predecessor the NZ Forest Service, said he realised have important it was to keep how important it was to keep the trees watered when re-searching rainfall records.

We had three years in a row where we were under one metre [of rainfall]. That's the first time in 50 years of records that I read that we had three dry years in a row," he said.

"That was before the dieback

started. And I believe that was the trigger point to make the trees that weak that the pathogens got at them. So that was the trigger point to make me think, we've got to do something.

The committee received advice from the Waikato Regional Council while planning the project. The tree stand itself is being monitored by the council or part tored by the council as part of its push to restore and protect indigenous forest stands.

dieback... Early indications suggest a potential link to climate stress, with trees that are periodically flooded appearing to be more affected than trees in permanently wet or permanently dry locations.

in permanenty wet of permanenty dry locations.

"The stress of experiencing flood and drought extremes may make these trees more susceptible to attack by soil pathogens (Phytophthora and Pythium species), which have been detected under kahikatea trees," a statement from the council said.

Council scientist Yanbin Deng said they were impressed with the dedication of the volunteers looking after the domain. Council visits to Turua in 2023 and 2024 found most of the domain's trees had remained healthy, with the forest experiencing a slightly increased health score for improvements in species composition and winter bird food species, thanks to recent planting undertaken by the domain volunteers. Several of the trees have been tagged for ongoing monitoring.

for ongoing monitoring.
"It's an experiment... I don't think it's been done before. But it just makes



sense to me," Jim said of the irrigation project.

"[Dieback] is here. What we're going to do is keep the trees healthy and they'll fight it off.

"In a hundred years' time [I hope] it starts to look like a natural native bush. But it's not a scientific project. It's an asset to the town. People love it, they bring a plastic chair around and sit here and just take in the ambience. And that's what we want."

Testament to mining heritage ready for rail trail

three-metre tall testament to Thames' Athree-metre tall testament to mannes strong mining heritage" will be the latest sculpture installed along the Hauraki Rail Trail.

Designed by Thames artist John McKe-owen, *Miners' Gates* has been constructed from old railway sleepers, and will be put in place alongside State Highway 25. Consisting of 12 frames that stand more

than 3m high and 2.5m wide, John told *The Profile* the work references the timber bracing put in mining tunnels to prevent

He hoped his piece would prompt the public to recognise the "contribution, hard work, and extreme risks" forebears

undertook to build the community.
"I spent some time in Japan, and they Torii Gates at the entrances to temples and sacred places. *Miners' Gates* act as a gateway to Thames from the south and a gateway to Hauraki from the north. They also represent protection and security in a dangerous world," he said.

In 2015, the Thames Public Art Trust held a competition in which artists sub-mitted designs to be installed as part of the trust's sculpture trail initiative.

John - who jointly won People's Choice

said the initial brief was for kinetic or moving sculptures, but he wanted to "turn that around and have everything else moving around the artwork".

'[Miners' Gates will be] arranged a cou-

ple of metres apart in a S-pattern and you will ride through them," he explained. "So, the cyclists and walkers will move, there will be a 'swish swish' sound as you pass them on a bike, and as the sun moves through the sky, the shadows will move around also."

The 12 frames were made from creosoted oak railway sleepers imported from England, John said, as they were the only ones long enough. The steel boots and connections were made by Kopū Engi-

neering.
"[Fellow trustees] Paul Sylvester, Rob Johnston and I assembled the frames in Paul's shed over three days in the weekends, and have stored them out in Kōpū waiting installation," John said.

He also had to face some challeng-

during the construction, including scrounging a crane truck to pick up the

sleepers, sparing time for initial assembly, and gaining "a seeming legion of consents and installation funding

He said installation started last week, kicking off with a re-alignment of the concrete path between the Thames Airfield and Thames Rugby and Sports Club.
"This has been helped by the generous


donations from the estates of Jo and Tata Ru and Jimmy Baynton - this has been completely funded by them and the art trust," John said.

"This has been a great privilege to be

able to make our fantastic wee town a bit better for our future and enjoyment, and I am looking forward to many more fabulous and funky art pieces being brought to life in our area

Gardening

Prepare now for next season

fter a mixture of weather conditions Awith some dry sunny days, we may start to experience cooler nights with overnight dew, signalling the time to prepare the garden for the next season's planting. If it is dry, keep watering to make the most of the late summer crops to help supplement the weekly shop.

Once crops have finished producing it's time to remove spent plants and re-plenish the soil with a mixture of blood and bone, sheep pellets and a good general garden fertiliser. Dig well into the soil and water in then you are ready to start planting out your new seedlings.

Just a note: If you collect your own seeds for later propagation, now is the time to do this before composting.

Any old plants pulled out can be cut up and added to the compost bin. While any garden areas are empty take time to top up garden beds, replenish the soil with a new layer of compost, blood and

bone and sheep pellets.
Plant Now: Leafy greens: leeks, carrots, silver beet, spinach, celery, winter lettuce. Salad crops: lettuce, rocket, mesclun blends. Brassicas: broccoli, cauliflower, kale (cavalo nero and curly kale). Herbs: mizuna, parsley, coriander, chives and chervil. Protect all new seedlings from snail and slugs with a slug bait. If possible, cover your brassicas with mesh to protect from the white butterfly.

It is also time to replenish the soil in your flower gardens with compost blood and bone and sheep pellets. Top up the mulch too, great for not only keeping weeds at bay but also to help plants with warmth over the cooler

months. Continue to plant your favourite winter flowering seedlings, pansy, viola, primula, polyanthus, calendula, cineraria, lobelia, poppies, alyssum, stock and snapdragon.

It is also time to plant spring flowering bulbs. Daffodils can be planted out from late February to the end of May. Early planting gets them off to a good start for better root development. Plant in full sun and well-drained soil. Anemones and Ranunculus are easy to grow, stagger planting for an extended flowering

Hyacinths are a beautiful addition to any garden. They are best planted out March/April in a cool spot. Protect all new plantings with slug and snail bait.

Citrus trees are heavy feeders so feed

with a specific citrus feed. This ensures healthy green leaves and better growth, flowers and fruits. Mulch around the roots to conserve moisture.

Continue to harvest apples, pears, grapes, peaches and plums if you're lucky enough to still have fruit on the trees. Once stone fruit have finished, prune to shape and remove dead or diseased branches. Autumn is the ideal time to sow or repair your lawn. Now is a good time to fertilise your lawn to promote nice healthy growth. Pull out any tired summer herbs and replant parsley, chives, rosemary and mint. The compost will benefit from all the addition of the trimming and pruning of spent crops.

Legacy down the ages

was recently at a family reunion with my I was recently at a family reunion with my wife's whānau. It was a brilliant weekend - celebrating life, family, history, and the land that shaped their roots. There were stories shared, beach swims with the kids, bush walks, and plenty of laughs as we all came together. But what captivated me most was the

idea of legacy.
This family's story is one of generational faith. They lived on a remote farm, completely cut off from access over land. The house itself was built with materials brought through the bay,

and any trip to civilisation required a long journey by boat.

More than 80 years ago, in this isolated corner of the country, a missionary arrived on horseback to share the Christian message. The parents of the family believed, were baptised, and started walking a new path of faith. Fast forward to the present day: the family reunion wrapped up with a church service on Sunday, and a huge number of relatives turned up to worship together. What struck me was how one action, one decision, can ripple through time. A single moment, like that missionary's visit, can alter the course of a family for generations. It reminded me of the power we hold in small, seemingly insignificant actions. A kind word, a moment of encouragement, or an act of faith can change the trajectory of a person's life—and beyond. I think of a story a teacher once told. He was stopped on the street by a vibrant young woman who asked, "Do you remember me?" When he didn't, she explained that he had saved her life. As a student, she had been on the brink of suicide, feeling hopeless and unseen. One day in class, this teacher noticed her work and praised her eye for detail and design, telling her she had a bright future. That single comment gave her the hope to carry on. Today, she's a successful fashion designer, thriving in her passion.

As I stood at the family reunion, surrounded by generations shaped by faith, I couldn't help but marvel at how legacy works. Our words, choices, and actions matter. They ripple outward, touching lives in ways we may never see, echoing through generations yet to come.
